Arbitration’s Anti-Erie Doctrine

This Article argues that the result of the Supreme Court’s FAA jurisprudence is a body of law that, while nominally embedded in the court’s preemption jurisprudence, is so divorced from the text and history of the FAA as to amount to the creation of a federal common law of arbitration. This federal common law has displaced large swathes of state law, bringing about a sweeping but underexplored change in traditional state authority and relationship to contract law.

En Banc Entendre

This Article presents data new in both time and type to investigate whether the nature of en banc procedure is indeed changing, and whether the data justifies worries about the degradation of norms critical to the rule of law.

Equitable Estoppel in the Age of Adhesive Arbitration

This Article deals with the state of contemporary consumer and employment contracting – specifically the ubiquity of binding arbitration clauses, which I call “adhesive arbitration” – and how the Federal Arbitration Act is being applied by the courts such that these contracts-within-contracts are precipitating a radical development to the doctrine of equitable estoppel and courts’ application of third-party (nonsignatory) enforcement.

Policing the Family with Predictive Analytics

This Article presents the most comprehensive dataset on predictive analytics in family regulation that currently exists. Normatively, it looks at how and why counties have started adopting programs utilizing predictive analytics in their family regulation processes, and what the consequences have been.
